



Special Legislative Advocacy Issues for the month of September

1. Co-Sponsor Milestone Puts Star Act on Key House Calendar

The **Major Richard Star Act** has reached a milestone goal of 290 co-sponsors in the House – the threshold for it to be placed on the chamber’s consensus calendar. This significant accomplishment, along with ongoing efforts in the Senate, show clear progress in MOAA’s work to expand concurrent receipt to more than 50,000 combat-injured veterans who lose a dollar of retirement pay for every dollar of VA benefits they receive.

2. NGAUS Washington Report, 16 August 2022

PACT ACT President Joe Biden last week signed the Sgt. First Class Heath Robinson Honoring our Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics Act into law. The measure will provide medical care to an estimated 3.5 million veterans suffering from health conditions from exposure to toxic substances. The Department of Veterans Affairs has established an online resource for information or filing a claim at www.va.gov/resources/the-pact-act-and-your-va-benefits. Robinson was a member of the Ohio Army National Guard until dying from lung cancer in 2020. He deployed to Iraq and Kosovo.

MISSOURI STATE LEGISLATIVE INITIATIVES 2nd Regular Session, 101st General Assembly

- The Missouri Council of Chapters continues to focus on key legislation that affects our military, spouses, families and veterans. Chapter members are encouraged to advocate for these issues with their elected officials.

- In 2022, the Missouri General Assembly passed a proposed amendment to the Missouri state constitution to create the Missouri Department of the National Guard. The Governor approved and signed this amendment for approval by the voters in the November 2022 general election.

Amendment 5 would create the Missouri Department of the National Guard. (HJR116) (SJR35) under the charge of the Adjutant General appointed by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate, charged with providing the state militia and other defense and security mechanisms as may be required.

MOAA members are encouraged to vote “Yes” to approve this constitutional amendment on November 8th.

Missouri Amendment 5, the Department of the National Guard Amendment is on the [ballot](#) in [Missouri](#) as a [legislatively referred constitutional amendment](#) on [November 8, 2022](#).

A "yes" vote supports providing the state's national guard with an executive department called the Missouri Department of the National Guard.

A "no" vote opposes this constitutional amendment, thus keeping the state's National Guard as part of the Missouri Department of Public Safety.

What would this ballot measure change?

Amendment 5 would create the Missouri Department of the National Guard as an administrative department within the state's executive branch. As of 2022, the Missouri National Guard is part of the Missouri Department of Public Safety.

As an executive department, the adjutant general, who commands the National Guard, would be a member of the governor's cabinet.

Amendment 5 would define the department's purpose as providing for the state militia, upholding the U.S. Constitution, upholding the Missouri Constitution, protecting the constitutional rights and civil liberties of Missourians, and providing other defenses as required.

November US Military History

1620: The Mayflower Compact is signed in what is now Provincetown Harbor, near Cape Cod, Massachusetts

1783: Annapolis, MD becomes the first peacetime US Capitol

1798: Congress agreed to pay a yearly tribute to Tripoli, considering it the only way to protect US shipping in the Mediterranean, as the US has no appreciable Navy as yet. This decision was later reversed by Thomas Jefferson, leading to the invasion of Tripoli, and the famous line in the Marine Corps hymn.

1820: USN Capt Nathaniel Palmer discovered the frozen continent of Antarctica

1861: Julia Ward Howe writes the lyrics for the Battle Hymn of the Republic, later sung by Union Troops to the tune John Brown's Body, which had been composed in 1852.

1863: President Abraham Lincoln delivers "a few appropriate remarks" at the dedication of the Gettysburg National Cemetery

1864 - Sand Creek Massacre, resulting in heavy loss of life to the Native American tribes of Cheyenne, Arapahoe, Wutapai.

1867: Dynamite is invented by Alfred Nobel. He later also invented the blasting cap, to detonate dynamite rods.

1883: At exactly Noon on November 18, American and Canadian railroads began using four continental time zones, to end the confusion of dealing with thousands of local times, emblematic of the power shared by the railroad companies at the time.

1906: International Distress Call "S-O-S" is adopted at the International Radio Telegraphic Convention in Berlin

1917: Provisional government of Aleksander Kerensky falls to Bolsheviks, led by Vladimir Ilyich Lenin

1918: At the 11th Hour on the 11th day of the 11th month, the Great War ends.

1921: Exactly three years after the end of World War I, the Tomb of the Unknowns is dedicated at Arlington National Cemetery

2002: President George W Bush signs bill creating the Department of Homeland Security

October Meeting Recap

John Sellars, Director Emeritus of the Springfield History Museum, was again our guest speaker at our October OEMOAA Chapter meeting. For those who may recall his previous visit with us, he was at that time quite entertaining, giving us a wealth of details about the foundation and development of Springfield. His visit this time was no different in that respect. This time, he took us on a photo tour around our city. He has been able to find a number of old photos, and replicate them in many cases with new images taken from the same perspective. The difference, as one would expect, is really amazing, given the time difference between pictures. He was even able to share photos taken of the museum itself, taken during its renovation. It turns out that following a severe fire involving the building which now houses the museum, that asbestos was used throughout flooring, walls, and ceilings, to help make certain that the building would not again suffer serious damage from fire. During renovation, this asbestos discovered in abundance throughout. Of course all of that had to be remediated, in accordance with OSHA and other Federal guidelines, which meant that the project was going to take much longer, and incur greater expense, but in the end resulted in a significantly safer facility.



The Springfield History Museum is truly an amazing facility. It contains a number of immersive exhibits, and can educate the visitor on many aspects of the history of our city, from its very early days onward. If you have not had taken the opportunity to visit, it's highly recommended. It's really quite educational, as well as entertaining.
