May Meeting Recap



Our speaker for May was Maella Blalock, LTC, USA (Ret). She served as the Chief of the Office of Defense Cooperation at the American Embassy in Vilnius, Lithuania, following the breakup of the Soviet Union, as they prepared for NATO membership. She was responsible for planning and coordinating a diverse set of US military assistance in direct support of US foreign policy toward the Baltic states.

She presented us with a detailed history of her military career, including her graduation from local places such as Parkview HS, and Evangel University. She then entered the Army as enlisted, later becoming an officer. She was then assigned to the US Embassy in Vilnius, Lithuania. She has a very good understanding of the mindset of the Lithuanians, and thus with many other nations in the Baltic States. In 2000, and still today, the predominant thinking of the Lithuanians relative to national security is five-fold: 1) Economic Development, 2) Good relations with their neighboring countries, 3) Political stability, 4) NATO Membership, and 5) a credible defense force, based on a Western model.

She oversaw distribution of Excess Defense Articles (EDA) to the Lithuanians, which basically consisted of excess and/or outdated equipment that the US military was off-loading. She shared that it is somewhat unexpected to see the US now equipping the Ukrainians with Javelin anti-tank weapons, in their current conflict.

The Lithuanian military had to completely rebuild after the departure of the Soviets, as they had rendered useless much of the infrastructure. Pay for their military was abysmal, and there was no NCO corps. We have actually since then provided much training for their military, and helped them restructure their defense force in line with what we utilize in the US, which seems to be serving them well.

Currently, LTC Blalock is the First Vice President and Awards Chair of the 4 States MOAA Chapter, as well as the recording secretary of the Missouri Council of Chapters.



We were saddened to learn within the past few days, of the passing of Bettye Sue Lord. She was the surviving spouse of Chaplain Billy Lord, a long-time member of OEMOAA, who himself passed in October 2021. Her Memorial Service was held at the Gorman-Scharpf Funeral Home, with interment at the Missouri Veterans Cemetery. Our thoughts and prayers for comfort go out to their family.

New Member Bio – Robert Lanning



Robert Lanning is a 30-year military veteran, having served 13 years of active and reserve duty in the U.S. Navy and 17 years in the Missouri Army National Guard. He graduated from the Navy ROTC program at Penn State, received naval aviator flight training (Multi-engine), and served as a P-3 Orion Patrol Plane Commander doing anti-submarine and maritime patrols stationed at Brunswick, ME on active duty, and Navy Memphis in the reserves. His deployments included Bermuda, Azores, Italy, Crete, Canary Islands, Norway on active duty, and Japan and Okinawa in the Naval Reserves. His crew and squadron were credited for detecting the first Russian Delta-Class "boomer" submarine in the north Atlantic in 1975. He also taught Navigation and Naval Operations at the Navy ROTC unit in Boulder, CO. After leaving the Navy as a Lieutenant Commander (LCDR), Mr. Lanning joined the Army National Guard in 1992 as a Warrant Officer at the Aviation Classification and Repair Activity Depot in Springfield, MO and transitioned to become a UH-1 Huey and UH-60 Blackhawk helicopter pilot. "The AVCRAD never deploys" so they say, but in 2004 his unit was activated under the 5th Army and deployed to Kuwait, Iraq, and Afghanistan to provide maintenance to fighting forces aircraft and

ground vehicles (Army Oil Analysis Program, or AOAP). This included maintenance flights for helo repairs in Iraq and establishing an AOAP laboratory under frequent mortar and rocket fire in Bagram Airbase, northern Afghanistan. His accomplishments earned him a Bronze Star and Army Commendation Medal among other awards. Other Guard deployments were to Panama and Guatemala for aviation support to humanitarian Army and Air Force Engineers, and Navy transports to build medical clinics and school buildings in remote areas of those countries. He even had a chance to use his geology degrees to assist a Navy well-drilling division to log cuttings as they installed water wells for remote communities. Mr. Lanning took mandatory (involuntary) retirement as a Chief Warrant Officer 4 from the Guard at age 60. He continues working as a semi-retired hydrogeologist.

Mr. Lanning and Minuen Odom have been married for 31 years. Minuen is a retired Registered Nurse. She also taught science and biology in junior high school. Between them, they each have two sons from former marriages, all grown with families of their own (seven grandkids). Bob is involved with community bands (bass sax and contrabass clarinets), some choral groups, two Scottish organizations (yes, he plays bagpipes), and is an amateur herpetologist. Minuen's love is gardening and she belongs the Master Gardener group. Both are involved with the Episcopal church, and have taken musical touring trips to Russia, Germany, Austria, Poland, England, and Scotland with the Messiah Project, a Christian Arts Performance organization based in Springfield.
