Military Housing: Restore BAH at 100% of researched housing costs per Military Housing Area. Ensure barracks are safe and healthy places to live, verified by the chain of command and government- owned work centers. Codify procedures and authorities to increase out-of-cycle housing allowances to address emergencies such as reduced availability of housing and rising utility costs.

Health Care for Currently Serving and Retirees: Reverse cuts to the pharmacy benefit and establish policy guardrails to ensure access to prescription medications and limits on copay increases. Fix the TRICARE Young Adult parity issue by extending eligibility to dependents up to age 26 with no separate premium to bring TRICARE on par with requirements for commercial health plans. Require DoD to establish a transparent and well-publicized problem reporting system for beneficiaries experiencing MTF access challenges, including an annual report to Congress on the number and types of beneficiary access problem reports by MTF and steps taken by the Defense Health Agency to identify and address systemic access problems.

Health Care and Benefits for Veterans: Monitor recent major legislation enacted such as the PACT Act in the areas of health care, compensation, and follow-on support for surviving spouses and families, and seek statutory or policy changes as required. Compel Congress and the VA to accelerate caregiving and whole health care services, and modernization of Veterans Health Administration workforce and facility infrastructure to improve veterans access to high quality care.

Service Families: Improve congressional support for uniformed services families: Enhance programs to support spouse employment, ensure implementation of an effective basic needs allowance, and provide accessible, affordable childcare options. Overcome the lack of effective problem-reporting mechanisms and resolution systems in the Military Health System.

Survivors: Repeal the recoupment of last month's paycheck after retiree's passing. Continue to improve SGLI/VGLI updates to match inflation. Improve DIC baseline to align with other government entitlements' baseline of 55%.

Guard and Reserve: Overcome the lack of TRICARE coverage for the reserve component to maintain readiness. Overcome delayed pay for Guard and Reserve members when they are promoted or when they retire. Continue to support Guard and Reserve leaders, and advance legislative and policy solutions to support the total force.

Military ID Card Renewal/Replacement

ID cards are available at the Naval Reserve Center on N. Fremont **by appointment only**. No walk-ins! New white ID cards are being issued with REAL ID included so even if your card is indefinite or not expired, they will issue a new one if you want one. While at the ID card office it is a good idea to review personal and spouse information in the DEERS system for accuracy and currency. The office is located at **1110 N. Fremont**, just north of Chestnut Expwy.

To schedule an appointment:

-go online to <u>https://idco.dmdc.osd.mil/idco</u>. The ID card locator and appointment page comes up.

-click Continue on the Locator and Appointments box.

-enter your personal location info and select 25 miles, unless you live further away, fill in no other information then click on search.

-Two locations will show up. Click on Select NRC Springfield at 1110 N. Fremont.

-click on Schedule an Appointment at the bottom of the page

-The current month will be displayed showing any available appointment dates. If none are available go to the next month until available appointments are shown. Click on the day you want.

-Go to the bottom of the page and book an appointment time on the day you selected.

-sign off the website.

When arriving at the Naval Reserve Center, pick up the phone and dial **417-425-2598**. Identify yourself and they will let you in. Take your driver license for identity verification.

March US Military History

1789 – The first session of the U.S. Congress is held in New York City as the U.S. Constitution takes effect.

1863 – The first Army Medal of Honor is presented to PVT Jacob Parrott of the 33rd Ohio Infantry. Four others are also honored this day

1865 – General William Sherman and his forces occupy Fayetteville, N.C.

1939 – Georgia finally ratified the Bill of Rights, 150 years after the birth of the federal government. Connecticut and Massachusetts, the only other states to hold out, also accepted the Bill of Rights in this year

1941 – Lend-Lease Bill becomes law, when signed by President Roosevelt.

1942 – War Relocation Authority is created to "Take all people of Japanese descent into custody, surround them with troops, prevent them from buying land, and return them to their former homes at the close of the war."

1942 – Philippine Islands abandoned to Japanese forces by Gen Douglas MacArthur

1944 – The U.S. Eighth Air Force launches the first American bombing raid against the German capital. **1948** – The first successful tornado forecast predicts that a tornado will strike Tinker Air Force Base, Oklahoma. The 1948 Tinker Air Force Base tornadoes were two tornadoes which struck Tinker Air Force Base in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma on March 20 and 25, 1948.

1961 – Elvis Presley (26) performed live on the USS Arizona, a fund raiser for a memorial. Col. Parker, Presley's manager, came up with the brilliant idea to have Elvis Presley give the benefit concert in the 4,000-seat Bloch Arena next to the entrance to Pearl Harbor

1973 – Two months after the signing of the Vietnam peace agreement, the last U.S. combat troops leave South Vietnam as Hanoi frees the remaining, admitted, American prisoners of war held in North Vietnam (total: 591 released)

2004 – In Madrid, Spain, a series of bombs hidden in backpacks exploded in quick succession at 3 stations, blowing apart four commuter trains and killing 202 people and wounding over 1,450

2006 – USS Winston Churchill engages pirates off the coast of Somalia, killing one, capturing 12, after the U.N. Security Council on March 15, encouraged any naval forces near Somalia to take action against suspected piracy.

They offer support in the areas of Peer Support, Personal Care, Independent Living Skills, Assistive Technologies, Community Access, Informational and Referral, as well as Assistive Technologies. They have a model apartment which displays many of the assistive and access devices available to clients. These offer ideas for inclusion into new construction or remodeling, which may enable people to remain in their homes for a longer period of time, especially if physical limitations begin to present a hindrance to their usual activities. The apartment may be viewed at any time. For

information, contact the Empower: Abilities office. Their address is 2864 S Nettleton, Springfield, and their telephone number is (417) 886-1188 ext 217. They can also be reached through their <u>website</u>. It is worth noting that the presenter herself has a mild form of Cerebral Palsy as well as hearing loss, and is the mother of four children. This certainly demonstrates that disabilities can be overcome, and individuals can be valuable members of society.
