Listed below are some of MOAA's current "call to action" issues (taken from: The MOAA Newsletter January 22, 2026). Remember to let your voice be heard by contacting your legislators.

Shutdown Fairness Act (S. 3168)

What it does: Allows the Pentagon and the Department of Homeland Security to continue paying service members during any future funding lapse.

Improve and Enhance the Work Opportunity Tax Credit Act (H.R. 6231 | S. 3265)

What it does: Modernizes the Work Opportunity Tax Credit (WOTC), a nonrefundable tax credit employers can take for hiring target group members during the employee's first year on the job, by increasing the amount of the credit and adding military spouses as a target group. The program is intended to reduce the unemployment rate of "job seekers who have consistently faced barriers to employment" by incentivizing employers with a tax credit, according to the Labor Department.

Military CARE Act (H.R. 6796)

What it does: Requires the Pentagon to establish a digital system designed to improve access to care at military treatment facilities (MTFs) by providing beneficiaries with a standardized platform to report barriers to MTF care and creating a data record that does not exist today to give Defense Health Agency leadership and Congress the insights needed to address systemic access challenges.

Veteran Caregiver Reeducation, Reemployment, and Retirement Act (H.R. 2148 | S. 879)

What it does: Expands health care coverage and career transition support for caregivers, and would require a study designed to provide caregivers with a path toward financial security in retirement.

- Feb 13: Presidents' Day Weekend (Starts) – Many military commands observe the Friday before the holiday.

- Feb 19: Coast Guard Reserve Birthday – Marks the establishment of the Coast Guard Reserve.

MOAA's Current Top Legislative Priorities

Improve and Enhance the Work Opportunity Tax Credit Act ([H.R. 6231 | S. 3265](#))

What it does: Modernizes the Work Opportunity Tax Credit (WOTC), a nonrefundable tax credit employers can take for hiring target group members during the employee's first year on the job, by increasing the amount of the credit and adding military spouses as a target group. The program is intended to reduce the unemployment rate of "job seekers who have consistently faced barriers to employment" by incentivizing employers with a tax credit, according to the Labor Department.

Who it supports: Unemployed veterans and military spouses.

MOAA's take: MOAA has long championed this program, and the addition of military spouses. Continuing to offer this tax credit to employers while enhancing the program will ensure the veteran unemployment rate remains low. Expanding this benefit to military spouses improves financial stability for the currently serving military family, increasing military readiness and retention rates.

Veteran Caregiver Reeducation, Reemployment, and Retirement Act ([H.R. 2148 | S. 879](#))

What it does: Expands health care coverage and career transition support for caregivers, and would require a study designed to provide caregivers with a path toward financial security in retirement.

Who it supports: Millions of caregivers.

MOAA's take: "Just as our veterans answered the call to serve our nation, their caregivers also answered the call to step up and serve them," said Lt. Gen. Brian T. Kelly, USAF (Ret), MOAA's president and CEO. "These dedicated individuals put their own futures on hold — sacrificing financial security, career advancement, and personal well-being — to fulfill the nation's promise to take care of our veterans and provide the care veterans deserve."

Governing Unaccredited Representatives Defrauding (GUARD) VA Benefits Act ([H.R. 1732](#))

What it does: Reinstates criminal penalties for unaccredited claim representatives who charge unauthorized fees while assisting veterans with filing a claim for VA disability compensation benefits.

Who it supports: Veterans and retirees.

MOAA's take: Veterans deserve trusted, ethical, and accountable support when filing disability claims — support that protects their privacy, respects their service, and preserves their earned compensation. The goal is not to limit veterans' ability to seek help, but to guarantee that when they do, the assistance comes from accredited professionals bound by high ethical and professional standards ... and that our veterans will not be forced to surrender a portion of the benefits they earned in service to the nation.

Our January Chapter meeting proved to be quite interesting. We were treated to a visit from a member of the Four States MOAA Chapter, Kavan Stull. He has done considerable research about the person and professional history of Harry S Truman. He was dressed in period correct uniform, for The Great War. In the person of Truman, he related the pre-war as well as wartime experiences of Truman, whose military career began in 1905, at the age of 20, as an artillery officer. Following the conclusion of WWI, he left active duty, and opened a men's haberdashery in Kansas City. He tried to rejoin for service in WWII, but was too old to join. He ended up running for, and winning a seat in the US Senate, and from there was selected as Vice President under Franklin Roosevelt. When Roosevelt unexpectedly died of a stroke, Truman ascended to the office of POTUS, and there was faced with making some monumental decisions, including overseeing the development and deployment of nuclear weapons, which proved to be the turning point in the Pacific theater.

He left us with some words of advice from Truman: Work Hard, Do Your Best, Keep Your Word, Trust God, and Never Forget Your Friends.

February US Military History

1779 – John Paul Jones takes command of Bonhomme Richard. Formerly commissioned as Duc de Duras, Bonhomme Richard was a warship in the Continental Navy.

1789 – George Washington, the commander of the Continental Army during the Revolutionary War, is unanimously elected the first president of the United States by all 69 presidential electors.

1812 – Russia establishes Fort Ross on the coast north of San Francisco, eventually purchased by John Sutter in 1841

1805 – Sacagawea, the Shoshone Indian interpreter and guide to the Lewis and Clark expedition, gives birth to her first child, Jean Baptiste Charbonneau.

1861 – The Confederate States of America Provisional Congress convenes in Montgomery, Alabama. 1901 – US Army Dental Corps established

1912 – Arizona admitted to the Union, as the 48th state.

1942 – Federal government orders all domestic passenger car production stopped, and converted to wartime purposes

1946 – U.S. Tests begins using the Marshall Islands as a nuclear testing site. These tests would continue until 1958.

1955 – Operation Teapot begins. A series of 14 nuclear detonations at the Nevada Test Site, to determine the effects of nuclear weapons on a variety of materials and in a variety of conditions begins with detonation Wasp. This test evaluated the effects of low altitude detonations.

1962 – The first US Air Force plane is lost in South Vietnam. A C-123 crashed while spraying defoliant. Also, President Kennedy authorizes US military advisors to return fire, if fired upon

1964 – GI Joe debuts a popular American toy

1933 – The USS Ranger becomes the US' first aircraft carrier, built specifically as a carrier.

1962 – President Kennedy begins the blockade of Cuba. US bans importation of all Cuban goods.

1974 – F-16 Fighting Falcon flies for the first time

1978 – 1st “micro on a chip” patented by Texas Instruments

1990 – Central Committee of the Soviet Union agrees that the Party give up its 70-year monopoly of political power

1991 – In the most decisive actions of the Gulf War, VII Corps, moving directly east with three heavy divisions abreast, attacked the elite Iraqi Republican Guard units. At Medina Ridge, an attempted Iraqi ambush of the 1st Armored Division ended with the destruction of over 300 enemy tanks.

2003 – A US Army Black Hawk helicopter on night training crashed in the Kuwaiti desert, killing all four crew members.

2003 – The Bush administration sends supplies of humanitarian aid to the Gulf region to cope with refugees and displaced people.

2013 – Former US Navy Seal and US Sniper Chris Kyle and another man are killed at a shooting range near Glen Rose, Texas
